What's That in my HuHot?

Mary and I enjoy treating ourselves on Sundays after church by eating out, and one of our favorite restaurants is HuHot Mongolian Grill. Here you fill up a bowl with the ingredients you like, douse them with the sauces you like, then hand the bowl to the cooks who fry it up and give it back to you. On busy days, the meals on the grill get closer and closer to each other. **Ingredients sometimes make their way from one diner's selection to the next. Sauces intermingle. So in some ways, you never know what you're going to get.**

Once at the table, we'll find things we know we didn't select. Mary will not get onions; I'm not one for pea pods. So if we see any such items intruding in our meals, we will promptly expel the offending veggie and give it to our spouse. Sometimes, however, we end up with something neither one of us would select, hence the phrase, "What's That in my HuHot?" We'll dissect it, inspect it, discuss it, but unless we can identify it, we won't eat it.

How curious, then, that we swallow so much that our society serves up to us. Take this Christmas season. We would hope we would select love, hope, peace and joy, but the culture in which we live gives us back jealousy, despair, stress and sadness. Take a look at those shopping, playing, or working around you. Do they look happy? (Then again, look in the mirror. Do YOU look happy???) **What's happened between the time we put our values out in the world and the time the world hands them back? Has someone turned the kitchen over to demons? Why are we taking and eating what this sinful and broken world has made**

and served to us?

An example: We teach our children not to **take the Lord's name in vain. But TV shows continually have people exclaiming "Oh my G-d!" So it becomes part of our children's vocabulary. Even in church and in confirmation class, I will hear this phrase. Misusing the Lord's name has been served up by the world, and our kids eat it along with everything else on their plates.**

St. Paul urges the Thessalonians, and as your pastor, I encourage you (1Thess. 5:14-22):

¹⁴And we urge you, brothers, admonish the idle, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with them all. ¹⁵See that no one repays anyone evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to everyone. ¹⁶Rejoice always, ¹⁷pray without ceasing, ¹⁸give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. ¹⁹Do not quench the Spirit. ²⁰Do not despise prophecies, ²¹but test everything; hold fast what is good. ²²Abstain from every form of evil.

If Mary won't eat my onions and if I flick her pea pods back across the table, why can't we be as discerning when it comes to the values, attitudes, and teachings of the world that we take into our hearts and minds? If it doesn't taste good to us spiritually, we shouldn't eat it just because it's on our plate. So whether it's the TV in our living rooms, the books on our shelves, the radio in our car or the screens in our theatres, we need to ask ourselves (figuratively, of course), "What's THAT doing in my HuHot?" If it does not square with the Word of the Bible, then it doesn't belong there, and we shouldn't eat it.

Music, music, music! Lots of music will be echoing in the sanctuary as a service of Advent/Christmas music will enhance worship on Sunday, December 14th at both the 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. services.

CONCORDIA LUTHERAN SCHOOLS OF OMAHA

The Wider Omaha Lutheran School Assn. has changed its name to *Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha*. The change brings the corporate name of the Lutheran school system into agreement with the names of the schools it operates: Concordia Academy elementary school, at 108th and Grover St., and Concordia Jr/Sr High School, 156th and Fort St.

The schools serve a total of 440 students: 231 at Concordia Academy in grades kindergarten through 6th, and 209 at the Junior-Senior High in grades 7 through 12.

Concordia Lutheran Schools of Omaha is owned by 16 churches affiliated with the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod in Omaha and the surrounding area. In addition to the new name, the school system has a new logo:

Parents, young adults, choir members and other random church members are also invited to attend.

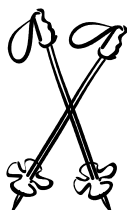

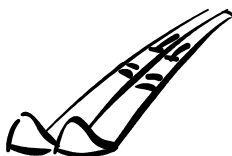


Right now, we don't know too many details. All we know is that we are going skiing or tubing and it will be on Sunday, January 25. We will let you know more when we know more!

All Midweek and Confirmation classes are now on winter break. Classes will resume, Jan 7th.

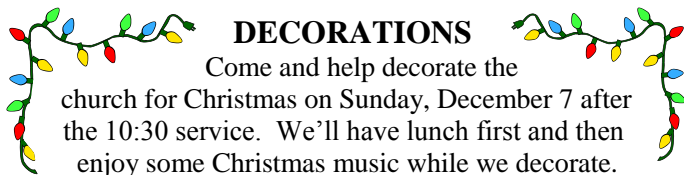

PROJECT HOPE

By now you may have noticed that we are using a shopping cart for collecting our donations to Project Hope. You no longer need to bend down to put your donations in a box as well as it makes it much easier for those who take the donations to their cars for delivery. We, again, thank Pastor Schmitt for getting the two carts for us and making the proper signage.

On November 2nd, Project Hope held an Open House in recognition of their 25 years of service to the community. It was a great time to meet the staff and volunteers of Project Hope. They really worked hard to have everything clean and organized. A 2 page newsletter regarding their 25 years is posted on the bulletin board in the narthex. It is located by the LWML happenings.

"What is a Project Hope" some of our new members of Zion may be wondering. Project Hope is a Lutheran Food Pantry serving one of the poorest zip codes in Omaha. Clients may only come one time a month and are given one paper grocery bag of food (it is called a pantry) for every two people living in that household. Project Hope relies on non-perishable donations such as the ones we here at Zion collect as well as monetary donations. Project Hope is also able to purchase food at very low cost from the Omaha Food Bank. However, the Omaha Food Bank has not had their shelves fully stocked so there are times when items are very limited.

The grocery bag "pantry" that Project Hope clients receive, includes 1 pkg. of cereal, 2 cans of tuna or chicken, 1 pkg. elbow macaroni, 2 fruits, 1 jar peanut butter, 4 cans of vegetables, 1 tomato sauce, 1 can pork & beans, 2 cans of soup or pkgs. of Ramen noodles, 2 boxes macaroni & cheese, 1 sleeve of crackers, 1 bag of popcorn and 1 pkg. of cookies. They also give out a selection of frozen foods if they are available from the Food Bank. Project Hope serves between 400 to 550 families a month.

To help you see the amounts and the variety that Zion donates, a poster is up on the table near the coat room. The October collection is now posted. As hard as the economy is becoming on us the members of Zion, just imagine what it must be like for the clients of Project Hope. We still are very richly blessed and it is in the difficult time that we need to step up and help where we can. Just a can of vegetables or box of macaroni & cheese is always so appreciated by the staff of Project Hope. The featured items for the month of December are tomato products such as tomato sauce, spaghetti sauce, tomato soup, tomato juice, etc. For January, the featured items are canned meats such as chicken, tuna, Spam, etc.

Thank you notes from Leigh, the Director of Project Hope, are posted on the bulletin board also. I, along with Project Hope, want to thank the members of Zion for being so faithful in this mission effort.

Remember to bring your tabs in some kind of container, zip lock bag, etc. and put them on the east counter in the Lakeview Room. Collecting these tabs helps you by recycling and it helps the Ronald McDonald House raise funds.
