Conformation or Confirmation???

Therefore, I urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God--this is your spiritual act of worship. Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is--his good, pleasing and perfect will. – Romans 12:1-2

It happens all the time that people misspell the word "Confirmation" as "Conformation." In a way, I can see why. After all, we're asking them to conform their lives to the Law, to conform to a way of God-serving-us worship that is by nature foreign to our we-must-serve-God instincts, and so on. But what's going on Sunday, April 29 at the 10:30 service is a CONFIRMATION. It's confirming the promises God made at the person's Baptism that forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation are held out to that person, and s/he receives them through Spirit-given faith.

A quick cruise through the Scripture shows that whenever "conforming" occurs, it is to the ways of the world, and that whenever "confirming" occurs it is generally the Lord's work in relation to His covenant with His people. This confirming of God's covenant of love happens throughout the Old Testament and is ultimately confirmed in our Lord Jesus Christ: *Christ has become a servant of the Jews on behalf of God's truth, to confirm the promises made to the patriarchs so that the Gentiles may glorify God for his mercy. –Romans 15:8*

So once again, we need to ask ourselves at this upcoming Confirmation ceremony, "Who's running the verbs?" This helps us to differentiate between acts of the Law (what we are commanded to do and forbidden from doing) and acts of the Gospel (gracious acts from God on our behalf). While the Lutheran Church rightly views the Rite of Confirmation as something other than a Sacrament, is it an instrument of the Gospel? Let's see.

From the Catechism: "What is Confirmation?"

Confirmation is: **A. Instruction in the Christian life.** Note the verse beginning this letter. OUR active-voiced actions that are forbidden are conforming ourselves to the world. The passive-voiced action that allows this to happen is we are to "BE transformed by the renewing of [our minds]." Remember that long, long explanation of the third article of the creed? "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him...?" That's Gospel action at work in us!

B. An opportunity to make a public profession of faith. [Jesus asked,] "Who do you say I am?" Simon Peter answered, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Jesus replied, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah, for this was not revealed to you by man, but by my Father in heaven." -Matthew 16:15-17
Who's running the show behind Peter's Confession? The same one who's behind the profession of faith our confirmands will make on Sunday: Our Lord.

C. A public rite to make a lifelong pledge of fidelity. OK, you've got me here. The actual rite with the robes, flowers, and pictures for the wall is a custom of the church, neither commanded nor forbidden by the Lord. However, the public confessions made within this rite are not without witness or promise in the Scriptures: "Whoever confesses me before men, I will also confess him before my Father in heaven. But whoever denies me before men, I will deny him before my Father in heaven. -Matthew 10:32-33

So then, on Sunday, who's at work? The kids making promises? Or the Father confirming His promises? Like always, it is the Lord at work. We pray that He will continue to work mightily in the lives of our confirmation students this year! In addition, let us remember God's promise to us, and reconfirm those promises so that we no longer CONFORM to the world, but CONFIRM God's Gospel-centered work in us!

GLOBAL CARE PACKAGES

As was reported last month, the Lydia & Rebekah Circles have decided to support this year's Global Care Packages for the children of India. In the past, the Circles have supported these gift packages to the women of Vietnam, Uganda, and Uruguay. An "India Tree" will be set up in May and have tags on them that list each individual item needed. Please read the tags carefully as some items will be specified for certain ages as well as for a girl or boy.

Many children of India were left orphaned by the Tsunami on December 26, 2004 especially in Tamil Nadu. As part of the ongoing efforts to share the Gospel in Tamil Nadu, these care packages are being collected. The Lutheran Hour Ministries ministry center in India will use the care packages filled with school supplies, a hygiene kit, and a toy, as a way to share the good news of Jesus to thousands of children.

The featured items for the month of May are soaps (bar, dish, or **dry** laundry). These are items that the clients of Project Hope **cannot** buy with their food stamps. Other items that the clients cannot buy with their food stamps are diapers, deodorant, toothbrushes and toothpaste, mouthwash, feminine hygiene products, hair products such as combs & brushes, shaving cream, shoe laces, razors, bathroom tissue and Kleenex.

As always, macaroni & cheese, peanut butter, canned fruits, and any and all other food items are so greatly appreciated.
